"These days, there's nothing left here for me, mate"

Carrying the weight of the world in his sports bag, a working-class lad trades his council estate for a one-way ticket out of Salford. Tom Gill's genre-busting drama goes on a poetic journey from heartache to redemption, against a backdrop of broke lads and sh*t dads.

Growing Pains is a semi-autobiographical story of a young working-class lad desperate to escape his Salford surroundings and difficult upbringing in pursuit of his dreams. It follows Tom through his early school days, through hanging in the park with 'stoner' mates, heartfelt chats with his Jamaican neighbour and trying to get served underage, to confrontations with his violent father. This is a likeable lad on a path towards self destruction. In a last-ditch bid to escape, he swaps his hometown for the capital, where he meets a girl who offers some advice and changes his outlook forever. He finally returns home to face the music (and his dad), armed with this new knowledge. It's like *The Alchemist*, set in Salford, and told through quick-witted lyricism and original songs.

As an actor, Tom Gill's recent work includes the forthcoming Mike Leigh film, Peterloo. *Growing Pains* was a sell-out at Edinburgh Festival 2016.



Tom Gill

Award-winning spoken-word artist, actor and UK Poetry Slam Champion, Tom Gill has collaborated with BBC Radio 1Xtra and voiced the spoken-word promo for Adidas and Manchester United's official kit launch. He trained at the Guildford School of Acting.

As an actor, theatre includes First Light at Chichester Festival Theatre; Buckets at the Orange Tree; Lines at the Yard; Dunsinane for the RSC and National Theatre of Scotland; Goodbye Barcelona at the Arcola; Life on a Plum/Banging Wolves for Wilderness Festival; Zig-Zag Zig-Zag for Manchester International Festival; How We Won The World for 24:7 Festival; Stomp at Theatre503; and Territory in Salford. From the critically-acclaimed Kuleshov Theatre (BU21 at Trafalgar Studios ***** The Stage **** the Guardian, The Times, Evening Standard) comes Carry on Jaywick, a new play about Jaywick, the seaside town which has fallen on hard times but lives to tell the tale.

Jaywick Sands is a small seaside town on the east coast of England in the county of Essex, whose once idyllic holiday chalets are now in a state of dilapidation and decay. Jaywick's unique history and astonishing levels of poverty have led to negative portrayals in the media, which characterise Jaywick as a desperate place of unemployment, anti-social behaviour, and hopelessness. These portrayals forget the important, but less quantifiable presence of a working class community spirit like no other.

Over two years of research, writer Dan Murphy formed a substantial body of audio recordings which he has shaped into a play more moving and humorous than you might expect. The production is presented using the recorded delivery technique, to bring the subtleties of the original utterances to the stage. It's a play with interviews, yet also reimagines scenes of community forums, line dancing evenings, and talent shows. *Carry on Jaywick* follows a number of residents as they prepare for their local talent show, trying to generate positive change in their community, and reflecting on the place they call home.



Helen is a burglar. Helen likes breaking into hospitals. She admits you into a surreal hospital as she sneaks around wards, x-ray rooms and cupboards to discover the bizarre, the bemusing – and the badger.

Directed by Hannah Silva, *To Helen Back* analyses sickness, health and what it really means to recover. It's a funny, unique and powerful theatrical experience, blurring boundaries between spoken word, comedy and performance art.

Helen has experience of sickness and health and has a lot to say about them. She wanted to create a performance that is both funny and sad. By being more open about them, the better we can look after each other and ourselves.

To Helen Back seeks to subvert the idea that we 'recover' from illness in a designated amount of time: the trauma of illness can endure a long time after the scars have healed.

The show celebrates Helen's disabled body and how it likes to move when she jumps, crawls and rolls about in her onesie. She never refers to her body as disabled; instead, it's "snazzy."
